BIRMINGHAM, AL – Birmingham residents Dolores Hydock and Bobby Horton will entertain Birmingham Botanical Gardens' third annual Southern Tales: Songs, Stories and Sing-A-Longs, a fun-filled, Holiday-themed afternoon, on December 4 from 2-4 p.m. "Jingle All the Way" will be a jolly collection of stories, songs and sing-a-longs to warm the heart and welcome the Holiday season.

Hydock, an actress and story performer, joins the event for the third year. Her eclectic background features an accomplished acting career, the release of seven award-winning storytelling albums and being a founding member of Birmingham's Association of Cajun Music Enthusiasts, experiences that all provide material for her stories.

Horton, who is performing for the first time at the event, has been a part of Birmingham's Three on a String for the last 35 years. He has produced and performed music for 13 Ken Burns documentaries, including "The Civil War" and "Baseball." Horton is widely recognized as one of the country's leading authorities on music from the Civil War period.
